Tough haul for Rotto winner

SWIMMER Jeremy Brooke-Smith won a gruelling Rottnest Channel Swim yesterday, as competitors said the choppy conditions were some of the toughest they had faced in years.

Brooke-Smith's victory in the annual race, now in its 23rd year, made up for his disappointment of last year when he finished third.

"I've wanted to win for a while" the 25-year-old said. "Thirty minutes into it I realised it was going to be a tough day in the office.

I just want to thank everyone for all their support."

Brooke-Smith finished the 19.7km race in 4hr 34min 37sec

Despite a summer of almost daily beach closures caused by shark sightings, the race had another humper turnout with 2300 competitors.

Premier Colin Barnett sounded the first race born just before fam.

Perth City Swimming Club's Heidi Gan and Simon Huitenga dominated the duo field to set a record of 4hr 8min Ilsec in their section. It was five minutes

faster than the previous best in 2005. "It was a pretty good race," Gan said, "We'd done lots of training."

Queensland lifesaver Jess Walker made it back-to-back wins in the women's competition, reaching Rottnest Island in 4hr 47min 58sec.

She won last year with a quicker time and said the event was "really tough" this year.

"It hart earlier than last year, but I heard my brother on the boat and my boyfriend so that helped," she said.

Team Enphoria - comprising Gene Williams, Patrick Hoey, Bobby Jovanovich and Josh Cleanese - was the first team to cross the line.

Many swimmers were competing to raise money for charity. Ian Gordon, of City Beach, raised more than \$12,500 for Diabetes WA

He entered the swim after his son, Findlay, was diagnosed with type-I diabetes after his third hirthday last year.

"Just thinking of this little boy (was what kept me going)," he said.
